

SECTOR NORTHEASTERN PENINSULAR NATURE TRAIL TERA ALTA

This Nature Trail is perfectly signposted and each of the old stations has a picnic area with information panels on the route. Bollards have been installed at crossings to prevent motorized vehicles from entering; ensuring the route is reserved exclusively for excursionists.

The route begins at the old Arnés-Lledó station, close to the River Algars. In fine weather visitors can take advantage of the bathing area at the weir under the old railway viaduct, while the nearby medieval villages of Lledó and Arnés are also worth visiting.


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- 2. The first section, towards Horta de Sant Joan station, inclines slightly thanks to the excavation of trenches and embankments in the vales of the terrain. After the first tunnel, the route reaches road T-334. Although the village lies off the route, it is worth visiting. It has been declared a National Cultural Heritage Site for the impressive views it affords of the surrounding landscape, such as the neighbouring mountain of Santa Bárbara, with the Convent of San Salvador at its foot, itself declared an Historical-Artistic Site and home to a Picasso Museum.
- 3. Resuming the trail towards Santa Bárbara mountain, a slight detour from the route leads to the convent. At this point the flatlands are left behind as the trail enters the gorge of the River Canaletas where a series of tunnels and viaducts offer spectacular views. The longest tunnels feature automatic lighting, but it is recommended that travellers always have a torch at hand.

We invite you to visit them and offer you the keys to enjoy the trip. In this brochure you will find a brief description of the Terra Alta Nature Trail and the map for the journey, along with recommendations to make the most of this experience. We only ask one thing of you: do not forget to leave everything as you found it. The conservation of these pathways is also your responsibility.

This intermediate section of the old Val de Zafán railway, which connected the area from which it took its name, in the province of Teruel, with Tortosa (Tarragona) features twenty tunnels and five viaducts. They lead the visitor through deep canyons with incredibly beautiful scenery, a source of inspiration for Pablo Picasso during his youth and later the scene of the Battle of the Ebro, one of the bloodiest episodes of the Spanish Civil War.

- 4. Before reaching the next station, the valley comes into view, facing the Sierra de Bot with the village of Bot in the foreground. This is the only village with a water fountain along the route. Past Bot is a monument to the old railway, consisting of a ticket from its last journey and after another couple of tunnels, opposite the hermitage of Sant Josep, the trail enters the canyon of the River Canaletas, the most spectacular section along the route with its steep sided walls.
- **5.** This section of the course winds across mountain ranges, through tunnels and over viaducts and ledges over rivers. In a somewhat more open canyon is Prat de Compte station, from where a small road winds its way up the side to the village. Further on up the road, a modern iron sculpture invites travellers to take a break and discover the Sierra de Bot in all its splendour.
- 6. Once again the canyon closes in, between the steep, sharp Sierra del Crestal mountains, which sink into the river. Just beyond this narrow stretch is another gem: the Sanctuary of Fontcalda, with natural thermal springs that can be accessed via a path.
- Peyond Fontcalda, part of the canyon still remains, while the river rounds the Sierra de Pandols, tunnel after tunnel, one of which has long since collapsed and must be skirted along a signposted path before reaching its mouth.
- 8. The final section of the route is marked by the old Pinell de Brai station, located beside road N-230. At this point



there is a carpark and recreation areas alongside the Nature Trail picnic area. The area is located four kilometres downstream and among other charms features a unique building; the Celler Cooperatiu winery, a masterpiece of Cèsar Martinell, a student of Gaudí's.

From this point it is also possible to continue along the Baix Ebre Nature Trail.

ELS PORTS

Els Ports is a vast limestone mountain massif located between the Catalan Sierra Prelotoral and the Sistema Ibérico, straddling the municipalities of Baix Ebre, El Montsiá and Terra Alta in Catalonia, Matarraña in Aragon and theValencian municipality of Els Ports.

This area is of great botanical and geological interest, as well as for its fauna, as it played an important role in the current ice age; becoming a refuge for diverse animal and vegetation species, some of them unique in the world.



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
