# CAMINOS NATURALES IN BALEARIC ISLANDS AND CATALÀNIA

**CATALUNYA**

Here, the Natural Trails running through the Balearic Islands and Catalonia are briefly described. Among them, there are short routes as Montfalcó to Congost de Mont-Rebei, River Glorieta and Son Juny; longer routes such as Muga, Camí de Aigua, Montanyes de Prades, El Carrilet and Baix Fère and rou-

tes in the vicinity of 200 km such as the Camí de Cavalls.

**Port de Vielha (Lleida).** The 12.1 km of this trail run along an old natural path used from ancient times as a way commun-

**Riu (Lleida).** The Segre River guides these two alternative trails from the suburban park of La Mitjana in Lleida; the first one, heading North, leads to the Chapel of Butsènit, while the second, heading South, classified as GR-2115 is now replaced by the current tunnel.

km route offers a journey back in time to visit some of the first examples of Catalan Romanesque architecture.

**River Segre and Utxesa Reservoir (Lleida).** At the beginning of the 20th century, the company 'Riegos y Fuerzas del Ebro', belonging to Barcelona Traction, Light and Power, Company Limited, and popularly known as "*La Canadiense*" (The Canadian) began the works of the Canal

along the old surveillance path, from Torres de Segre to the reservoir. **La Sèquia (Barcelona).** According to the records, in the 14th century, the municipality of Bages suffered a devastating drought. The solution arrived in 1383, when the construction of La Sèquia, a 26 kilometre-long canal which has been taking water from Llobregat River from Balareny to Manres.
